Some of the organisers of the above events are not directly involved with the UK Tour, but if they want to assist they are welcome to do so. All that is required of them is to make available the names of the Last 8/16 players in the Main and Consolation. This is purely a Biba project and any funding is via Biba and the event sponsor, PlayWSOB - entrants pay nothing towards it, it is a totally free-entry element of each event.

For the Last 8/16 of the Main and Consolation in each of the tour events, points are awarded as shown to the left.

A running points total and leader board will be published on the Biba web site following each event, and in the Bibafax upon publication. After the final event, currently the Irish Open, the top 8 scorers will become the qualifiers. These 8 qualifiers will be invited to take part in the Grand Final

to be held on the Saturday evening at the 2012 Bright & Breezy tournament, in January. The Finals will be an 11-point Knockout with a winner-takes-all prize of at least £250 plus extras from our sponsors, PlayWSOB.

Qualifiers must confirm their attendance for the Final by 7 November, 2012. If any of the qualifiers cannot attend the Final then the 9th scorer will be invited, and thereafter, 10th, 11th etc. until such time as we have an 8 draw. Any vacant places that occur on the day of the Final will be decided in the same way.

Remember. There are no fees to pay to enter the BBT - the only fees you incur are those to enter each event. The BBT is not an official part of the above events (excepting those organised and run by Biba) but it is hoped that its involvement will result in more entrants for each event.

Questions & Answers and Information about the Biba Backgammon Tour

Q: I regularly enter Biba tournaments, especially the Swiss events, my target being to do well in the Grand Prix and Ranking Championships, and hopefully win some money at the end of the year. The more BBT events with Grand Prix status there are the more likely it is that a non-member can get to the top of the listings. How do you intend to handle this should it occur?

A: Good question! First of all you have forgotten that a good few of those entering local events aren't Biba members. Each championship pays out to the Top 10 players and it is my intention that only current, active members can be listed in the Top 10. However, I think that the Top 10 will consist of such members, many of whom will also be taking part in the Tour as they chase those extra Grand Prix points.

Q: Why have you included the Wicklow tournament in the tour? Isn't it supposed to be a British backgammon tour? Surely you should be including tournaments only in England, Scotland and Wales?

A: You don't appear to have read the title of this page or understood what the letters, BBT, stand for. It is the Biba Backgammon Tour. Biba, via the BBT is supporting local backgammon and giving those that do well in the Tour a chance to win a few quid without having to pay to do so. I am hoping to include some more 'home-based' events next year. If you have a local club and want to hold a tournament with BBT status, please get in touch.

Ring a bell? Check it out! By Michael Crane


During the final of the Barceló Cup, Andy Bell and Nicky Check made numerous errors, 37 between them, including 11 blunders according to extremeGammon. This article takes a look to see where and what mistakes were made.



During their match quite a few mistakes were made, some of them quite big ones, by each player. In the positions shown, Andy is playing as white and Nicky as black. The match is to 11 points.

Game 1

Andy (w):0 Nicky (b): 0 Game 1 was played out without either player putting a foot wrong and it was ended by a cube in this position:




With one checker already on the bar Andy finds this an easy drop. Nicky has a half decent board and is favourite to hit the white blot on his bar-point. The correct sequence is double/drop, mainly due to the second white blot.

Game 2


Andy (w): 0 Nicky (b): 1 After a couple of opening 65s, Nicky is

After a couple of opening 65s, Nicky is on roll and it's here that we start a miniseries of mistakes.




According to XG the only part of this move that Andy got correct was 25/23! He then went on to play 13/11, 6/4(2). He doesn't seem to be looking at Nicky's potential; he's on track to to make a good

point next roll and perhaps severely restrict Andy's runners, therefore, hitting with 25/23, 24/18* is a much better move.




Nicky's reply is not as bad but it is still wrong. Having missed out on making another point he correctly goes for a timing play with 13/11, 6/1*. The problem here is that by playing 6/1* he has fewer covering rolls next time and he should have gone with 7/2* instead.




As it turned out it didn't matter either way, because Nicky was going to end up on the bar despite anything he could do! Andy makes a smallish error here when playing 25/24*, 11/10, 8/7(2); it is the 11/10 bit that XG doesn't like, preferring 23/22, moving up and hopefully being able to make an advanced anchor whilst having single-roll escaping chances.

Nicky comes in with 55: 25/15*, 6/1*(2) and Andy dances with 61.



It might be the smallest roll possible but this one is huge in what it can do - and Nicky squanders its potential and plays 11/10, 11/9 leaving three blots on near to the bar. It would have been better to have played 24/22, 8/7, making sure the lone runner can soon escape and the blocking bar-point, 8/7. Andy reenters with 32: 25/23, 25/22.

We then move along to this position:



This is double/take, advises XG, despite that fact white has a 5-prime with a black checker behind it. To be of most effect white needs a 6 before black rolls a 1, but Nicky drops and lets Andy have the point even though he wins around 30%.



In this Game we only have one checkerplay mistake, from Andy.

After opening ...



... Andy makes a blunder




If left alone, Nicky is going to make his 8-point if possible and reinforce his blocking prime, so, Andy needs to be moving up with at least one checker, 24/22, threatening to hit the blot if a 5 isn't rolled or make an advanced anchor. Andy's play of 13/11, 13/10 doesn't bother Nicky very much.


The game is terminated when Andy ships across a 2-cube, but, XG tells us he did it one roll too late. This is where he had a double/take position:



There's still some contact is this game (6s don't play so well for white) and the black blot on white's 1-point can be a pain in the arse as well as a prisoner. Prior to rolling this 44: 17/9(2), Andy should have cubed and it was likely Nicky would have taken, however the market-loser, 44, meant that after Nicky rolled 63: 13/4, he was cubed out in a double/drop position.




Andy (w): 2
It's Nicky's third move:




Now is the time to move a checker off each of the laden 13- and 5-points with 13/9, 6/3; with the plan of making homeboard points so that if or when he gets a blot on the bar, he can make it more difficult to keep it on there. Nicky moves 13/9, 24/21 instead, banking on the possibility of a hit next roll as he covers most of Andy's outer board.

51: 14/8



XG thinks that there's no need to risk a flyshot here with Andy's play of 13/11, 6/2, and opts for the safer 8/2. Nicky has a better home board and it's just waiting for a white visitor.

64: 13/7 8/4 43: 6/2 11/8 44: 13/9(2) 6/2(2)



Again, Andy flirts needlessly with danger with his play of 13/11, 13/8. Now that Nicky's home board is even stronger it is prudent to play as safe as possible with 8/6, 8/3 and lessen the heavy 8-point.

55: 13/3 11/6 8/3 54: 8/3 6/2



Not wanting to crunch his home-prime just yet, Nicky makes the mistake of running both checkers out: 21/18, 21/15. XG much prefers the crunchy 21/15, 4/1. But, in the end it didn't matter because he was cubed out next roll - which in itself was a blunder on Nicky's part according to XG's analysis.




It isn't too gammonish for Nicky at the moment and with the odds around 70/30 in Andy's favour, Nicky should have taken this cube. All it would take is one shot at a white blot and he could perhaps cashin the 2 win.

Game 5

Andy (w): 3 Nicky (b): 1


Just a single blunder in this game:



Playing 25/23, 13/7 certainly looks very good, but according to XG, looks are deceiving! XG prefers - by a long chalk - 25/23, 9/5, 7/5 and making the valuable 5-point before Nicky rolls a Joker 53 off the bar! Eventually Nicky is correctly cubed out.


Game 6

Andy (w): 4 Nicky (b) : 1




It's Andy's opening roll and XG just doesn't like the aggression of his 13/9, 6/5, preferring the conventional, 24/23, 13/9. Mind you, there's not a lot in it, and Nicky's next roll, 66: 24/18(2), 13/7(2) ignores it anyway!

A bit later on we have a cubing error:




Perhaps it's the 3-point blot that clouds Andy's judgment, but he takes this cube as XG tells us it's double/drop. He's got 20 reentry rolls, just over half of which hits the blot, but before that Nicky has a few that cover: 3s and 55. But, it all comes good in the end ... too good!

Takes 62: 18/10 41: 25/21 16/15* 55: Dances 54: 21/16 8/4 22: 25/23 6/4(2) 3/1 54: 16/7* 42: 25/23 6/2




I am not sure why Andy recubes here. Nicky is facing almost 20% gammons in this position and it makes sense to hold back a while to see what transpires. Nicky sighs gratefully and drops as XG screams out to Andy: Too good to double/drop!

Game 7




Nicky's play of 13/9, 6/5 is just too aggressive here and is unnecessary (again!). Certainly the 13/9 is correct but slotting the 5-point is not. With Andy having a three-prime straddling his bar the better 1 would have been 24/23. He is hit with 62: 24/16*.

A bit later on we get to this error:




Slotting with 13/4 is almost a blunder. It would have been better to have played 21/16, 13/9. This duplicates 4s (and 2s) nicely and gives good cover for making the 4-point next roll if possible. He gets away with it as Andy rolls 52: 25/23, 13/8; and Nicky then rolls 61: 10/4, 6/5.

It is here that Andy makes a blunder:




Nicky hasn't any spare checkers outside of his home board and a 6 will mean he'll have to break off one of his points. With this in mind the better play here is 13/8, keeping all the white checkers in front of all the black ones and not leaving a blot inside; instead Andy plays 8/7, 6/2. Mind you, Nicky's reply of 55: 21/16(2), 13/8(2) was a cracker! Andy responded

with 61: 13/6 to arrive here:




Nicky plays 20/16, 8/2*, and XG doesn't like it. Andy's runner can only escape with 5s and by playing 20/10 as XG prefers, white could well end up with two checkers back if he can't safety his 2-point blot. A little later Nicky is hit with 66 and then dances with a roll of 52, after which Andy pushes over a 2-cube.



It is the cube that proves to be Andy's undoing, even if it is the correct play!


A little later, after a redouble/take, we arrive at this blunder by Nicky:



Nicky only takes two checkers off: 4/0(2) whereas XG takes off three: 4/0, 2/0(2). It might not look much but as far as game winning chances go it is: two-off: 77%, three-off: 84.6%.




Nicky (b): 5



Perhaps Nicky has his eyes on the blot on his 11-point; this would account for his play: 25/23, 7/1*! XG prefers 25/23, 13/7, even though it leaves a double-shot. It is better to keep the bar-point and 3prime straddling it than to give it up for a simple hit. Either way he was going to be hit as Andy rolled 41.


Sometime later, Andy steps in with an error:



Playing 25/18 is wrong according to XG, it prefers 25/21 with a provocative, 13/10! It ships a checker off the laden mid-point, and, if hit, might well help in making a good advanced anchor - and it (slightly) duplicates 3s.

43: 25/18 61: 25/24






Big error here with 10/4, 8/4. It leaves four blots on and all it needs to get started is a 5 (or 44, or 42) off the bar. It's better to cut down the hitting numbers to a 1 with 13/7, 5/1*. As it turned out, Andy rolled 65, a hitting roll that lead to a correct, double/drop in his favour.


Andy (w): 7 52: 13/8 24/22 65: 25/14





Even though it leaves a direct shot on with a 2, XG's move of 9/5, 6/5 is better than Nicky's 8/3. It's too early to worry about being hit back - certainly the 5point is more valuable than the 3-point.


Several rolls later we get to this position where Nicky has an advanced anchor and will soon, failing a good double, have to crunch.



Here it is more powerful to go for a 6-prime: 8/6, 4/1 as opposed to semicrunching with 6/1. Andy would be far more afraid of a 6-prime than a 5-prime with the 6-point open.






A third 42 in a row isn't handled so well this time by Andy as he leaves a flyshot by playing 13/7. XG prefers to keep it safe with 7/1. Nicky rolls 54: 20/11, a move that XG agrees with but then falls victim to yet another 42: 7/5*, 5/1, pick&pass! He dances and is correctly cubed out.

Andy (w): 8




Nicky's second roll of the game is a biggish error: 13/7, 10/7. The bar-point isn't so good now that Andy has made a semiadvanced anchor. XG prefers to duplicate 6s: 24/18, 13/10. Andy does roll a 6, 63: 22/16*, 16/13. Then a third 63 pops out:



Slight error here with 25/16, better to have gone with 25/22, 24/18 and yet again duplicate 6s in the hope of keeping the lone white runner back. Nicky is hit again ... and he hits back






What looks like a good play, the doublehitting: 25/21*, 4/2*(2) is in fact a blunder! Nicky shouldn't have much trouble getting in with two open points - one checker @ 88.88%, both checkers @ 44.44%, so double-hitting has a very limited benefit, and holding the 2-point is not as good as holding the 4-point. Better here to play 25/21*, 13/11(2) and look for making it difficult for white to poke his nose out into the outer board.

Nicky rolls 53: 25/20, 25/22, Andy replies 64: 21/15, 13/9



Playing 20/13 misses an opportunity to slot the 5-point at the same time as getting the 20-point blot away from being pointed on. XG does this with 20/14, 6/5. Andy then rolls 32: 15/10 and then it's a blunder from Nicky:




Normally, making the 20-point is correct, but Nicky plays 24/20, 22/20, 6/4 and it's a blunder. This time the 20-point is too far out - it's easier now for white to jump over and begin making home board points on which to come in on. XG goes for 24/22, 13/11, 6/4(2) - making the 22-point keeps the pressure on white, the mid-point slot is an aid for the 5-point, and the 4-point is neatly made. A few rolls later and a correct double/drop gives Andy another point.

Game 11

Andy (w): 9





Nicky doesn't really achieve a lot with his play of 8/1*, an error. It is better to play 24/20, 13/10, trying to establish an advanced anchor and making another point on black's side of the board.

Three rolls later, following a Joker 44, Nicky correctly cubes Andy out.

Game 12


Andy (w): 9 Nicky (b): 6

After just five rolls Nicky ships across an early cube, which Andy correctly takes. During this game there was one error, albeit a small one from Nicky, but, aided by 33 and 66 in the bearoff, he goes onto win


Game 13

Andy (w): 9 Nicky (b): 8


Once again, Nicky ships across an early cube and once again, Andy takes, each player being correct. Not long after we get this position:



Nicky plays everything safely: 15/13, 11/6, which isn't very dynamic and very unproductive. 15/10, 13/11, however, makes a good blocking point and teases Andy to hit off his 20-point anchor should he roll a 5. A bit later:



Not the best of rolls, but played 13/2 it is even worse. Duplicating 2s with 13/7, 8/3 is XG's choice. Black won't be too bothered about being hit for his checkers are rather flat and he could perhaps do with the timing.




Unless white gets a hit he isn't going to win the race being 36 pips behind at the

moment, therefore picking up his 22-point blot and moving onto his 6-point with 22/20, 7/6 is of no use at all. He needs to provoke some sort of contact and this is better done with 8/5 giving a few small rolls to make another home board point in readiness for the hit. Unfortunately he never does get the hit and later resigns the two points.


Game 14

Andy (w): 9 Nicky (b): 10


It's Crawford now and all Nicky has to do is win a single point, so why does Nicky make the gammon play...



... 13/7, 13/11* in this position? He doesn't need to take such risks and would have been better off with 23/21, 8/2, keeping everything tidy. The game progresses for several moves until we reach this blunder from Andy:




Andy doesn't need to play his runner so far, 18/12, and it would be better where it is, lying in wait for black to come around; however, 6/5 is correct. The 6 is better played 8/2 - at the moment unless black rolls 65 he's not going to offer a multiple shot in Andy's home board.



It's Andy's next roll and he runs



12/3. XG prefers 10/1, leaving the 12-point checker *in situ*. He is still behind in the race and needs to make sure black doesn't get off lightly if a blot is exposed.



Andy attempts to stop Nicky by keeping his two outer board points intact and goes with 6/4, 6/1. This is unlikely to work and he should have played 8/6, 8/3 and prepared for the bearoff.

It goes to the wire quite literally when Andy rolls a very timely 66 to clear his last four checkers after Nicky's previous roll left Andy just over 13% to win!

Game 15

Andy (w): 10 Nicky (b): 10 By now both players are down to seconds on the clock each. Throughout the entire

game just one small error is made (by Andy), which is remarkable considering that almost every move played was moved within 12 seconds! However, of the two, Nicky managed his time better and Andy runs out of time to lose the match! He began this game with just 12 seconds on his clock, and Nicky had 25, when it ended Nicky still had 15 seconds left



Position #1

one. Result!" He punched the air,

triumphantly.
"With the cube my side and one white checker on the bar and one on my 1-point I need to go for a gammon so it's 16/14* and then carry on

14/10 so that I get great chances to make my bar-point thus giving me time to get my back checkers out." He was about to sit down, but before doing so he came out with a cracker. "Doctor, Doctor, I feel all dry, like a biscuit. Oh, you must be crackers!" Chortling, he sat down as Mummy Bore got up.


Like Daddy Bore, she started with a joke, "Doctor, Doctor I've just swallowed a

pen. Well sit down and write your name!" Baby Bore liked that one and he giggled like a girl. Mummy continued, "I have to agree with Daddy Bore in that 16/14* is OK, but, if you're going for the gammon you need to stop white anchoring on the 1-point, and this is achieved with 8/4 giving 3s next roll to hit the 1-point blot." Before sitting down she threw another joke at them, "Doctor, Doctor I'm having trouble with my breathing. I'll give you something that will soon put a stop to that!" She sat down. Daddy Bore almost stop breathing as he guffawed away. Baby Bore got up.

Not to be outdone he too started joking, "Doctor, Doctor I think I'm an adder. Great, can you help me with my accounts then please!" He giggled again. "And something doesn't add up with the two moves from Mater and Pater," he said. "What happens if you don't roll another 2 for ages? You'll crunch, that's what. The best move here is to ignore white and play 24/22, 16/12. This way you can get out with a 6 or make the 22-point with a 2 next time. And, before I go . . . Doctor, Doctor I snore so loud I keep myself awake at night. Sleep in another room then!" Girly giggles surrounded him as he sat down.

Goldiblots, tired of the awful puns thought she might as well get in on the action. "Doctor, Doctor I feel like a dog. Sit!" No one laughed. To break the embarrassing silence she quickly got Daddy Bore back up.

Position #2



Black 4 White 0

"Doctor, Doctor I keep getting pains in the eye when I drink coffee. Have you tried taking the spoon out?" The family laughed - Goldiblots groaned. "I always say, never look a daft horse in the mouth, and if you don't hit 18/17* with this roll, you're as daft as a horse. Now that white is on the bar you can move 18/15 and duplicate 5s and 3s. And I will leave you with this: Doctor, Doctor I feel like a pack of cards. I'll deal with you later!" He sat down thinking to himself, "I'm a card." Goldiblots was thinking something else! She called Baby up.

Predictably he began with a joke. "Doctor, Doctor I think I need glasses. You certainly do, Sir, this is a fish and chip shop!" Girly giggles convulsed him. Slowly he recovered his composure and went on, "Well, I am joking for I don't need glasses to see that the correct play is the usual 31 play, make the 5-point with 8/5, 6/5. It is without doubt, the best point on the board and once made will remain intact until the bearoff, added to that is the bonus that to hit me, white will have to give up his anchor and he has a very poor home board and is unlikely to keep me dancing. Mummy Bore went straight in with, "Doctor, Doctor my baby is the image of his father."


Never mind just so long

this tie-in to her joke. On a roll (jokewise, at least) she finished with another dig at Daddy Bore, "Doctor, Doctor what did the x-ray of my husband's head show? Absolutely nothing!" She laughed - he didn't. It was his turn next.





It takes Brian 1m 38s to see that Mardi has a much better distribution and that he (Brian) is very top heavy and in great danger of having a few points without any checkers on them very soon. In accordance with XG's analysis Brian correctly drops.






At the beginning of this game, when Nicky Check remarked about him trailing 7-0, Brian said, "The way Mardi's been playing I'm lucky to have the nil!"


Here, Mardi has got Brian where he wants him - on his 1-point and needing a combination roll of 4 with 4, 5 or 6 to escape. So, why does he play 18/16(2), 3/1*(2)? This allows Brian to roll more escaping numbers. XG much pre- ▶

fers 18/14(2), getting the runners nearer to safety. But, what happens next? Brian dances with 61 then Mardi rolls 63: 16/13, 16/10*. A few rolls later and it's looking dire for Brian.



Brian is in real danger now of being gammoned and he needs a cockshot to get back into the game. He rolls it, 62:25/17*! Mardi dances with 44 and Brian cubes him out to win his first point. However, it wasn't a cube and Mardi should have taken.


In the next game Brian makes two very bad decisions. The first is a big blunder.



Brian takes a long time over this (4m 48s) as he tries out a few combinations, 13/7, 13/12*; 18/17, 18/12*; 23/17, 13/12*; but is always worried about return shots. Eventually he settles for 23/17, 6/5*, which is wrong. It leaves all direct 5s plus 32 and 41, a total of 15 rolls, but it would have been far better to have double-hit



The position at the top of the next column is too good to double and Mardi, recognising a good thing when he sees it, drops. Mardi didn't even look at playing 7/6,


Arthur made it a 'double' when he beat Rosey (nee Gilbertson!) in the final.

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This is Lewis Brierley, he is an 11-year old boy from Eccles, Manchester, with Cerebral Palsy. Lewis was diagnosed at a very young age with spastic diplegia cerebral palsy. He is a happy little boy who would love to live a normal life and do things like playing football with his friends. Lewis has to rely on a wheelchair to get around.

Spastic Cerebral Palsy is a form of cerebral palsy that causes tightness in the muscles. Because of this tightness, spastic cerebral palsy patients have a difficult time controlling their movement. Their motions may be abrupt and jerky.

Lewis was born in April 1999 and is now eleven and has just started high school and attends five days a week. He has been offered the chance of an operation in America that will remove the spasticity in his legs allowing him to walk unaided and for the first time feel comfort at a level that we all take for granted.

Cerebral Palsy is treated in the UK with a combination of Botox, Physic and eventually muscle/tendon lengthening surgery. However in other countries *Selective Dorsal Rhizotomy* (SDR) is the first procedure of choice, therefore ridding the child of spasticity at an early age and allowing normal muscle/bone growth. Such an operation is available in the USA.

He has already been accepted by the Children's Hospital, St. Louis, to have the operation needed to change his live forever, and Biba is supporting Lewis's appeal to raise £45,000 for the operation and the aftercare needed for it to be successful.

At future Biba tournaments there will be fundraising events in support of Lewis and it is hoped that members will take part and help to get Lewis the surgery he needs to lead a normal active life.



Biba has already launched an online raffle (www.backgammon-biba.co.uk/LewisRaffle.htm) of donated prizes and at the forthcoming Christmas UK Finals in December there will be a raffle of Christmas presents.

Also, in January, at the **Bright 'n' Breezy** it is hoped to hold a further raffle of unwanted Christmas presents; for this to be a success please, bring/send whatever gifts you can to make the raffle worthwhile.



What man can ever forget these famous legs? Admired by men and envied by women the world over. In a pose we all know well, these are the legs of Marilyn Monroe.







Can you imagine being an 11 year old sitting in a wheelchair and knowing that the only thing preventing you getting up and running around with your friends is an operation?




Two more mercenaries Heard & Check brought up the rear choosing to travel by car rather than letting the train take the strain.



Eire Invasion

The Friday night warm-up consisted of a €200 Jackpot with Sean Casey beating Peter Bennet in one semi-final and Brian Lever victorious over John Broomfield in the other. With a late night finish Sean and Brian decided to share the €2,800 pot and a profitable evening. To determine an actual winner Sean tossed a coin and Brian called "Heads". Now for the 1st Irish joke - it was a Euro Coin which does not have a head. After much head scratching, excuse the pun, Sean declared Brian the winner.

Saturday morning dawned crisp and sunny with a shine only surpassed by our Irish host's welcome. Noel Byrne firmly shook Peter Chan's hands and smiling said "Have you brought your camera?"



What a silly question to ask Peter because, quick as a flash (again excuse the pun), out came the camera to snap Noel and friends so notching up his 100th photo since arrival in Dublin.

He redoubles to 8, Snowie squeals "No Redouble – Take", so Brian correctly takes and then facing a match winning score of 13-4 duly redoubles to 16. I hesitate to say "Luck of the Irish" but with the dice in his favour, Joe triumphs.

By Saturday evening the last 8 were known of which 5 were English including yours truly. Then it was a short walk to the Temple Bar area with its multitude of excellent restaurants, bars and Irish music.



The night was enhanced by Halloween with many revellers in costumes and masks.

At 2:00 am on Sunday morning the clocks went back 1 hour but, cue for 2nd Irish joke, no one told Sean Casey. At noon i.e. 1 o'clock old time Sean closed the Last Chance entries at 32 but was then later faced by other players wanting to enter before the 1 o'clock, correct time, deadline.

Brendan Burgess, Sunday's TD, then had to reopen the field to accommodate new entries thus making a Last Chance field of 64. Cue for 3rd Irish joke – in his haste Brendan allowed buy-backs to produce a field of 66 not 64. Fortunately as is the nature of Backgammon players the extra two accepted the oversight gracefully.

Meanwhile beaten semi finalist Kevin Jones progresses to the Last Chance final only to lose to Nigel Hamill.

Peter doubles in the next two games and Marc drops for Peter to retake the lead 12-11, Crawford. The tension mounts as Marc wins the Crawford game to make it DMP. Then a nail-biting finale for this

gripping match which Marc, with some 16 minutes left on the clock, wins to be crowned Irish Open Champion. For the bookies Peter, having ensured the audience, witnessed a great match had 1min 42sec left on the clock.





By Sunday afternoon we had just one player out of the Main 32 starters on 5-5, Neil Everitt. His next opponent, a 4-5 would come from the match between Bob Bruce and Chris Ternel, and although he didn't say so, I reckon Neil would prefer to play against Bob than Chris! For a good time it looked as if Bob was going to make it, but, not for the first time this weekend, Chris came from behind to clinch his place on the recording table and a shot at Neil.


On paper, and with reference to the rankings, Chris was favourite. Neil got off to a good start, 2-0, and he led all the way with Chris occasionally catching up: 2-1, 2-2, 4-2, 4-3, 6-3, 7-3, 7-5, 7-6, 8-6, 8-8; and it was at this match score where we learn a lesson. Beginners are (nearly) always advised to make their 5-point or bar-point whenever possible, but Chris Ternel is not a beginner! Here he is as white failing to make either point!




Neil starts off with a good 42: 8/4, 6/4.



Chris replies with 52: 13/8, 13/11




Neil compliments his previous play by rolling a great 31: 8/5, 6/5, the textbook play!




Chris rolls the perfect numbers to make his 5- or bar-point but doesn't. Instead he plays 24/17*.

This is the correct play, according to XG, to make his 5-point would be an error and to make his bar-point a blunder.



Neil comes in with 22: 25/21, 13/11(2).



Chris rolls another 5- or bar-point maker, and instead of making one of them plays the same move as last time: 61: 24/17. The other two plays are blunders.

So, what have we learnt from this? We've learnt that in backgammon what you should do isn't what you always do!


Circumstances dictate what moves are best even when it comes to deciding whether or not to make a very good point.

The match progressed and despite playing the correct opening rolls of this game, it was Neil that won the point: 9-8.

In the next game, with Neil 2-away, 3-away and whilst trailing by 7 pips, and bearing in against a 4-point anchor with a spare checker, Neil cubes!

Chris thinks for some time over this and he can be seen on the video calculating his chances. At Neil 2-away, 3-away, Chris has a 40% chance of winning the game - or if he takes, then after the inevitable recube, he'll be 40% to win the match. If he drops, at 1-away, 3-away Chris drops to 25%. After some consideration he correctly takes. He gets a shot a few rolls later but misses, and then a little after that he tries to race when the pipcount places him just 2 pips behind; however, it was just a tad too late and after Neil rolls a 44 it's all over for Chris.



This was a happy outcome for me for it gave me an outright winner on 6-6 and two on 5-6, Andy Darby and Uldis Lapikens. The initial tie-breaker of head-to-head failed to position them, as did shared opponents (they both beat Gerry Enslin), so it was left to the average ranking score of the opponents, and Uldis came out as Runner-up.

In the **Consolation** element, Brian Lever (eventually) got the better of Lawrence Powell in the 5th Round, and Mardi Ohannessian got the better of Peter Finnimore. The same tie-breaker was applied;

they never met, they both beat George Hall and the average ranking favoured Brian and it was he that took home the winner's trophy.


